2. Reason for the Revision

Based on management conditions throughout the fiscal period ended June 30, 2007 and a review of its distributions-per-unit forecast, MID REIT anticipates that its actual distribution per unit for the fiscal period ended June 30, 2007 will differ by more than 5% from the previous forecast announced on February 22, 2007. The revised forecast is based



on an expected increase in rental income compared with the forecast at the beginning of the fiscal period. Rental expenses, interest paid and related costs are also anticipated to fall below initial estimates.
